- I. A resident queried the new ashes plot layout in the Burial Ground and the plan crossing a pathway. Clerk reported that the plan had been amended accordingly.

Appendix 1

Good evening,

As you have heard the Parish Council Chairman – Tyrone Ripley cannot be with us tonight and the Deputy Chair Cllr Pam Denny has notified that she may be late, so this responsibility has been designated to me.

I will follow the traditional format of our annual report, with a focus on the different aspects of Parish life that are within our responsibility.

PADDOCK and RECREATION GROUND:

Thanks go to Cllr Pam Denny for her constant supervision of the Paddock and Recreation Ground ensuring it is always well maintained.

Residents will have noticed that the Recreation ground has been marked out into two mini football pitches, after the council recently granted permission for that use to support our youngest residents, the training facilities and the hard work that goes into arranging everything from the marking of the pitches to supervising the sessions is all done by an army of volunteers working with the Upchurch Colts Football Club for the benefit of others.

Last year The Chair reported that the Council had secured funding from the Swale Western Area Committee and the Queenborough Fishery Trust for an exciting woodland trail in The Paddock; Cllr Denny has worked tirelessly on this and it shows, the results look amazing, we are eagerly awaiting the addition of 'bug hotels' from the children at Holywell to go alongside the bird boxes already installed, and the bat boxes soon to be installed as part of the project, we are grateful to Phil Newbery for his help with those.

So much for our youngest villagers, we have not forgotten our older children and young adults and have designed and are applying for funding for an exciting 'adventure area' with £27,000 worth of appropriate equipment for them to enjoy the Paddock just as much as our younger children do now.

STREET LIGHTING

Cllr Ernie Berntsen is our wiz on the lighting literally keeping the lights on! We are sadly still trying to get the electricity price reduction that goes with LEDs makes, this is the result of a complex and archaic calculation of our electricity use, which is still based on data from years ago, in fact I wouldn't be surprised if it's lifted from the time, we had gas lamps its that out of date. Some good news though, our new lights are better for the environment and our local wildlife and faults and difficulties on the lighting are now fixed usually within 24 to 48 hours, helping to keep us, I don't think any of us will miss lights out and even worse constantly flashing or on during the day for weeks on end!

VILLAGE APPEARANCE

We have not yet had a village 'litter pick' this year, although through our Clerk we have had good service from Swale Borough Council when needed and of course the centre of the village is kept clean by our caretaker. Our thanks go to Terry Honeyman who did the job earlier in the year and then to David Kew who took over to provide continuity and finally to our new caretaker Lynne Balcombe who started her duties a couple of months ago. Finally, we have all seen those few tireless villagers who give of their own time, picking up litter as they take their regular walks, that role benefits us all and we are very grateful for it. Can I also remind you that the Parish Council has a supply of litter picking equipment which is available for residents to borrow if they would like to litter pick their local area.

Every summer the village enjoys the beautiful blooms in the cascade planter in the heart of the village and the barrier baskets along the fence line at the Recreation Ground by Oak Lane and by Chaffes Lane. This year those displays will be in red, white, and blue in celebration of the Coronation of King Charles the Third in just over a week's time, I hope the weather holds for us all, in particular those who have street parties planned.

The Parish Council's support for the Coronation has been to provide funding to Holywell School to give every child at the school a commemoration mug, I have seen the designs and hopefully they will be something the children (or their parents) will treasure for years to come.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS:

Thank you to Planning Committee members and particularly Cllr Gary Rosewell the Chair of the planning committee, he has continued to attend Swale Planning meetings representing Upchurch Parish Council on behalf of the village.

BURIAL GROUND:

Thank you to Cllr Helen Boakes and Cllr Denny for their constant supervision of the Burial Ground, we have a new plan for burial and ash plots which may interest some of you, but hopefully not anytime soon! David Kew gets his second mention in dispatches for the great work he does keeping the burial ground rubbish under control helping to maintain a clean and respectful aspect in this important part of our parish life and history.

CHRISTMAS 2022:

Our thanks once again go to Mr Bob Friend for his kind and generous donation of the Christmas tree, something he has done every year since it was instigated by the Parish Council.

I am sure residents will agree with me the tree and lights are a wonderful centre piece to the village in the Festive season, kindly spare a thought for those who brave the winter conditions to install that every year. Upchurch has a superb winter Fayre early in December at which Father Christmas and a couple of Elves made a visit for selfies, as sign of the times! Father Christmas, and lots of villagers said they loved it, one villager in particular told me she thought it was the best ever and that her children were mesmerised by the experience. The good news is I know Father Christmas is intending to visit again this year and if the Elves have behaved, he will be bringing them too.

LADIES THAT KNIT:

A note of thanks for the time and effort given by the ladies that knit who have continued to put on the amazing displays we have seen in the village, this wonderful act of creativity lifted us all during the pandemic and continues to do so, and the silhouette display of Remembrance in the Church Grounds last November was particularly poignant, well done!

Talking of Remembrance Day

The Council had a wreath laid at the service in Upchurch and in Ferques, thanks go to Cllr Gerry Lewin for again organising this important event. The village made its thanks and remembrance of those who died so that we may live in Freedom obvious with a show of support for the British Legion and the work they do with giant poppies on just about every post we could find.

The Parish Council made a very significant change last year, we said goodbye and thank you to our clerk Wendy Licence and welcomed our new clerk, Nina Henley. We took that opportunity to update all our policies, working practices, recording systems, banking stuff and get ourselves into the digital age, all that behind the scenes stuff has taken Nina hours of painstaking and detailed work, which will benefit every one of us going forward as our systems are slicker and more refined, seemingly simple tasks that in truth have taken days and weeks in the past are now much easier, the best example so far is the dramatic difference this year experienced by those who rent allotments from us.

The Parish Council supported the excellent work done by the Village Hall Committee through the experience and contribution of Cllr Gerry Lewin. The Committee have done a stunning job so far and I know they have detailed plans to continue improving this vital community space.

Finally, I have reported on the work of the Parish Council, nine volunteers from within the community, who give their time for the benefit of residents.

Next week heralds the start of a new four-year term, five council members have been elected in an uncontested election so there will be four opportunities to co-opt members of the community to the Parish Council, Details of that process will be publicised after the elections next week.

Parish councils like ours do a fantastic job, but they are sadly in decline, three Parish Councils in Swale did not get enough applicants to be quorate and will be re-advertised... when you read some of the criticism on social media levelled at people trying to help it is no surprise.

After those somewhat sobering thoughts, I will finish on a high note.

Parish Councils across Swale were invited to nominate someone from our community to be considered as the Borough's guest at the Kings invitation to a Royal Garden Party. Upchurch nominated Sue Rossiter for this honour, and I am delighted to report that she was then chosen as our Borough representative, Congratulations Sue, we all hope you have a superb day in glorious sunshine.

On behalf of your Parish Council may I thank all of you for your on-going support and can I ask you to show your thanks for the work they and the Clerk have completed on your behalf in the past year.

Appendix 2

Swale Borough Councillors Report – Cllr Richard Palmer

Over the past four years, we have seen some fundamental changes at Swale Council.

When elected in 2019, we had campaigned against excessive housing numbers forced upon the council by Central Government. Michael Gove, the Secretary of State for Housing, has proposed handing back control of housing numbers to local councils.

We changed the Council from a Cabinet system to a committee system. In a cabinet system, only a handful of councillors made decisions that affected all Borough residents, often with minimal input

from other councillors or consultation with the public. In the Committee system, all councillors are involved and have more significant input into decisions. This leads to a more democratic process for the Council and our residents.

The Pandemic struck during my first year in office, and the council was able to provide support to people in the community. I volunteered, like many, to help deliver medicines and food to vulnerable people via the central assistance run by Swale Council. What became very clear was that to get through this pandemic, we all needed to step up to the plate and help those who were housebound either because of age or illness or because of the quarantine rules. In Upchurch village, people organised a local support network, which is still helping people today via food banks and other assistance. I was very pleased that I was able to be involved and give my support to this and many other groups.

During the pandemic, the Council acted as the Government broker passing on Government funding to businesses, village halls, and community organisations; everything took a back seat at the council so that people could be supported as best we could, but without people looking after and supporting neighbours and friends the pandemic would have been far worse.

There were times during the pandemic that I had to battle to get some vulnerable and housebound residents the care and support they needed and on occasion even the vaccine as they were unable to get to a vaccination centre.

During a time of long queues in shops, shortages of essential supplies, and missing out on long-awaited hospital appointments, haircuts and social activities, we all found a renewed appreciation for our lives as we knew them, whilst we are grateful that many of us survived and made full recoveries, it is important to remember that some lost their lives and many are still on the road to recovery. We got through owing to the ordinary person in the street and with the spirit of good old Tommy Atkins.

As the pandemic subsided and normality started to return, with a few ups and downs along the way, people started to venture out and meet family and friends. Then we could even go on holiday (and then, some of us even had to stay in a holiday Inn on our return).

Like us, the council's business started to return to normal, whatever that is now. Zoom meetings and such.

The council also set up area committees. Swale has four area committees, and we are part of the western area committee, which comprises mainly rural villages from the west of Sittingbourne. The area committee has provided funding to Upchurch for some local projects.

I have helped obtain grants to support village groups and activities in

Upchurch = £6,780 for the village hall plus advice on Government COVID grants administered by Swale Council.

Some of these grants have:

- Supported the purchase of a defibrillator
- Jubilee celebration Grants (£500 to Upchurch PC)
- £10,000 towards Upchurch cricket club for new nets post COVID

I have given, via my member's grants, support to many village groups, such as
